Re: **Leftist ideologues in your future department**

Dear Madam Attorney General,

As you know, cleaning out the Federal bureaucracy is essential to Making America Great Again. The Deep State has terrorized this country, threatening democracy itself. Government employees who abuse their power must be dealt with.

I am writing to you today because my organization has compiled a list of individuals currently holding positions in the Voting Section of the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice who cannot be trusted to faithfully carry out the agenda of the elected President of the United States. These people are woke radical leftists and donors who have no place in the Department of Justice. In order to restore the American people's trust in election integrity and a neutral civil service, they must be fired and replaced with America-first attorneys who will execute on the agenda the American People voted for in November.

This list is a modest compilation, and we look forward to sharing more names with you of problematic staff at the Department who need to go.

Janie Sitton

Sitton is a longtime [donor](#) to leftist politicians and has long been at the forefront of promoting the [transgender agenda](#). In 2000, while working for the DOJ, Sitton authored a radical article that called for the [adoption of a new legal system deemed "transgender jurisprudence."](#)



The [article](#), titled "Introduction to the Symposium, (De)Constructing Sex: Transgenderism, Intersexuality, Gender Identity, and the Law" and published in the William & Mary Journal of Race, Gender, and Social Justice, also stated the need to "rethink" the basic known "assumptions and constructs upon which our society and laws are based." Sitton even took issue with common traditions such as identifying a newborn infant as a boy or girl based on the child's sex. Sitton argued that society has been wrong to assume or assign a gender to infants.

Catherine Meza

Before taking her present position as an attorney in the Voting Section of the Department of Justice overseeing the enforcement of federal election laws, Catherine Meza held positions with organizations known for the advancement of liberal policy ideals -- including the NAACP, the ACLU, and MALDEF.

One notable example of her legal work while serving as chief counsel for the NAACP Legal Defense and Education Fund was a joint [letter](#) with the Giffords Law Center to Prevent Gun Violence, [a left-wing gun control advocacy group](#), to Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton.

In the 2020 letter to Paxton, Meza and the gun control advocates urged General Paxton to issue a public statement "reminding Texas residents that voter intimidation is a serious crime" ahead of the November election. [The top example of voter intimidation given by Meza; people who are not wearing masks or observing proper social distancing guidelines.](#)

Additionally, conservative attorneys Christian Adams and Hans von Spakovsky featured Meza in their [Every Single One](#) article in 2011. They highlighted Meza's long history of working for far-left organizations.

Daniel Freeman



Daniel Freeman is a [hyper-partisan leftist](#) who is utterly unfit to be a civil servant. Not only has he [donated](#) to liberal politicians numerous times, he also made [headlines](#) when it was reported by the Daily Caller that Freeman had caused crowds to "boo" former Speaker of the House and former Vice-Presidential Candidate Paul Ryan during the Presidential inauguration ceremony in 2013.

John "Bert" Russ IV

Russ is a [donor](#) to leftist politicians and uses his power to push the left's agenda. In 2015, it was [reported](#) by Spectrum News that the DOJ joined with the League of Women Voters and other groups to challenge the legality of a North Carolina law prohibiting same-day voter registration/voting. Spectrum reported that Russ was one of the attorneys involved in the case and that Russ was pushing for an injunction to stop the changes.

Another example of Russ's work at the DOJ includes a 2021 [complaint](#) against Georgia's election integrity initiatives, with Russ being listed as one of the Voting Section attorneys on the complaint. The complaint alleged that the State of Georgia had **racist intentions in prohibiting unsolicited absentee ballots from being mailed to voters, requiring voter identification, and prohibiting the potential bribing of voters with food and drinks at polling places.**

The complaint further alleged that Georgia's SB 202 "was enacted with the purpose of denying or abridging **the right of Black Georgians to vote on account of their race or color.**"

Russ has also authored several law review articles in the past focused on LGBTQ activism, including an **emphasis on issues relating to LGBTQ minors and school kids.**

In a publication entitled "[Shall We Dance: Gay Equality and Religious Exemptions at Private California High School Proms.](#)" published in the New York Law School Law Review in 1988, Russ argued for the application of certain constitutional interpretations regarding the rights of same-sex couples seeking to attend prom at a public high school and discussed the "political" expression implied to be demonstrated by taking a same-sex date to a school prom.



Russ's article concluded by explaining how in California that religious, private high schools could be made to provide certain rights and recognitions to gay youth seeking to attend prom as a couple. Further, Russ explored the merits of legal action against the schools by stretching the application of California's anti-discrimination laws.

Other publications written by Russ include a law review article that focused on using case law to help "gay youth" organize at public schools and another that **examined the interests of gay foreign nationals seeking asylum in the United States based on sexual persecution in their home countries.** The article, titled "[The Gap Between Asylum Ideals and Reality: Evaluating Human Rights Conditions for Gay Americans by the United States' Own Progressive Asylum Standards.](#)" was published in the UC Davis Journal of International Law and Policy in 1998.

Dana Paikowsky

In addition to [donating](#) to liberal politicians, Paikowsky's [LinkedIn](#) shows that she has worked for years pushing **far-left political agendas.**

For a little over a year prior to graduating Harvard law, Paikowsky worked as a policy associate for the **Open Society Foundations**, an organization founded by billionaire financier George Soros.

But that isn't Paikowsky's only tie to the influence of Soros' money.

Shortly after graduating Harvard Law School, Paikowsky then went to work **for the Campaign Legal Center (CLC) as a fellow for the Equal Justice Works program.**

The CLC has received significant funding from Soros in recent years.

Her work history includes a third connection to Soros funding, working as a legal intern for the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights.

Paikowsky also has extensively championed initiatives to **get more jail or prison inmates access to voting while incarcerated.**



Her 2019 law review article published by the Harvard Civil Rights-Civil Liberties Law Review in 2019 titled "[Jails as Polling Places](#)" suggested an extensive framework on her agenda to turn "jails into polling places." Paikowsky began by describing numerous examples of local elections across the nation, including local district attorney races, where a small number of inmate voters could have changed the election results.

But Paikowsky isn't only advocating for more misdemeanor offenders and unconvicted felons in jails and prisons to vote. Paikowsky wrote that activists need to continue to look to the political process to "combat felony disenfranchisement," or restoring convicted felons' ability to vote.

Paikowsky's work to convert jails into polling places was highlighted in a short video by Now This News. [In the video](#), Paikowsky noted the impact that more jail/prison inmates had on the 2020 elections.

Finally, it is important to note that very few Americans, less than one percent in fact, donate to political campaigns and such a significant donation history is a clear mark of an ideologically committed partisan.
