I, Leesa Manion, Prosecuting Attorney for King County in the name and by the authority of the State of Washington, do accuse ALEXANDER MOISES ARNAEZ-GUTTIERREZ, AND KEVIN DANIEL SANABRIA OJEDA of the following crime[s]: **Attempted Murder In The First Degree, Kidnapping In The First Degree, Robbery In The First Degree, Theft Of Motor Vehicle**, committed as follows:

Count 1: Attempted Murder In The First Degree

That the defendants ALEXANDER MOISES ARNAEZ-GUTTIERREZ AND KEVIN DANIEL SANABRIA OJEDA and each of them in King County, Washington, on or about January 21, 2025, with premeditated intent to cause the death of another person, did attempt to cause the death of Maria Guadalupe Hernandez Velasquez, a human being, who died on or about January 21, 2025; attempt as used in the above charge means that the defendant committed an act which was a substantial step towards the commission of the above described crime with the intent to commit that crime;

Contrary to RCW 9A.28.020 and 9A.32.030(1)(a), and against the peace and dignity of the State of Washington.

And further do allege the defendant, Alexander Moises Arnaez-Gutierrez and Kevin Daniel SANABRIA OJEDA at said time of being armed with a handgun, a firearm as defined in RCW 9.41.010, under the authority of RCW 9.94A.533(3).

1 **Count 2: Kidnapping In The First Degree**

2 That the defendants ALEXANDER MOISES ARNAEZ-GUTTIERREZ AND KEVIN
3 DANIEL SANABRIA OJEDA and each of them in King County, Washington, on or about
4 January 21, 2025, with intent to inflict bodily injury on Maria Guadalupe Hernandez Velasquez,
5 did intentionally abduct such person;

6 Contrary to RCW 9A.40.020(1)(c), and against the peace and dignity of the State of
7 Washington.


8 **Count 3: Robbery In The First Degree**

9 That the defendants ALEXANDER MOISES ARNAEZ-GUTTIERREZ AND KEVIN
10 DANIEL SANABRIA OJEDA and each of them in King County, Washington, on or about
11 January 21, 2025, did unlawfully and with intent to commit theft take personal property of
12 another, to-wit: money, jewelry, credit cards and other personal belongings, from the person and
13 in the presence of Maria Guadalupe Hernandez Velasquez, against her will, by the use or
14 threatened use of immediate force, violence and fear of injury to such person or her property and
15 to the person or property of another, and that such force or fear was used to obtain or retain
16 possession of the property, to prevent or overcome resistance to the taking, and to prevent
17 knowledge of the taking, and in the commission of and in immediate flight therefrom the
18 defendant was armed with a deadly weapon, to-wit: firearm, and displayed what appeared to be
19 a firearm, and inflicted bodily injury on Maria Guadalupe Hernandez Velasquez;

20 Contrary to RCW 9A.56.200(1)(a)(i), (ii), (iii), and 9A.56.190, and against the peace and
21 dignity of the State of Washington.

22 And further do accuse the defendant, Alexander Moises Arnaez-Gutierrez and Kevin
23 Daniel SANABRIA OJEDA at said time of being armed with a deadly weapon, to-wit: drill,
24 under the authority of RCW 9.94A.825 and 9.94A.533(4).



PROSECUTING ATTORNEY CASE SUMMARY AND REQUEST FOR BAIL AND/OR
CONDITIONS OF RELEASE

The State incorporates by reference the Certification for Determination of Probable Cause prepared by Detective Sarah Gerlitz of the King County Sheriff's Office for case number C25002398.

The State requests bail set in the amount of \$1,000,000.00; as set by the court at first appearance. The defendant and accomplices brutally attacked and tortured the victim, taking her out of the county and leaving her on the side of the road believing she was dead. The facts of this case demonstrate a sophistication and pre-planning and a level of violence that is alarming. The defendant does not have any prior felony convictions known to the State. However, given the facts of this case and level of violence the defendants engaged in, the State believes that the requested bail is appropriate, to ensure the safety of the victim and the community, to ensure the defendant's appearance in court and to ensure the defendant does not engage in any interference in the administration of justice.

2 CERTIFICATION FOR DETERMINATION OF PROBABLE CAUSE

3 That Sarah Gerlitz is a (n) Detective with the King County Sheriff's
4 Office and has reviewed the investigation conducted in the King County
Sheriff's case number (s) C25002398;

5 There is probable cause to believe that Alexander Moises Arnaez-
6 Gutierrez DOB 08/11/1999 and Kevin Daniel Sanabria Ojeda DOB 12/15/2000
7 committed the crimes (s) of Kidnapping in the First Degree (RCW 9A.40.020),
8 Attempted Murder in the First Degree (RCW 9A.32.030, RCW 9A.28.020), Robbery
9 in the First Degree (RCW 9A.56.20) and Theft of a Motor Vehicle (RCW
10 9A.56.065) Ojeda.

11 This belief is predicated on the following facts and circumstances:

12 On 1/21/25, at approximately 2210 hours, King County Sheriff's deputies
13 responded to a welfare check at the Park Des Moines Apartments, located at
14 10002 Des Moines Memorial Dr S, in the city of Burien.

15 The reporting party, Maria Avila, reported that at approximately 2200 hours,
16 a neighbor heard a female screaming. The neighbor found the female's hat, and
17 the female was not answering her door or cell phone. The female in question
18 was later identified as the victim, Maria Guadalupe Hernández Velazquez, a 58
19 year old resident of the Park Des Moines Apartment complex.

20 Deputy Pavlovich arrived on the scene but saw no obvious signs of a
21 disturbance. Deputy Pavlovich called RP-Avila. According to Deputy
22 Pavlovich's report, Avila called 911 on behalf of a neighbor. The neighbor
23 informed Avila that she heard Hernandez screaming and yelling for help in the
24 parking lot. Deputy Pavlovich obtained Hernandez's phone number, called her,
25 and left her a message. Avila then informed Deputy Pavlovich that she
received news that Hernandez was shot and was at Harborview Medical Center.

While on the scene, Deputy Pavlovich met with witness Luis Popyes. Popyes
advised that he observed unknown males hanging out in the parking lot near a
vehicle he had not seen before. Popyes later heard a gunshot and a woman
screaming. Popyes was reluctant to provide further details, fearing being
identified as a "snitch."

At approximately 2315 hours, Deputy Pavlovich was advised via KCSO dispatch
that the Kittitas County Sheriff's office requested a welfare check at 10002
Des Moines Memorial Drive. Kittitas County Sheriff's Office Sgt. Foster
advised that Maria Hernandez arrived at Harborview Medical Center. Hernandez
was left on the side of I-90, near milepost 57, with multiple gunshot wounds.

Kittitas County Sheriff's Office Detective Blume interviewed Hernandez on
1/22/25 at approximate 1:30 AM at Harborview Medical Center via a Spanish
interrupter.

Hernandez stated that on 1/21/25, she finished her day job as a house cleaner
and hung out with a friend. She arrived home at about 2000 hours in her 2022
gold Hyundai Elantra (The license plate was later verified by law
enforcement) and parked in stall 308. Hernandez stated she was on the phone

1 with her daughter when she noticed three Hispanic male suspects hanging out
2 in the parking lot of her apartment complex. Two were outside near the
3 entrance to the walkway where her apartment is located while the third male
4 was sitting in the driver's seat of a gray or silver compact sedan. Hernandez
5 was not completely sure on the color of the vehicle. Hernandez stated the 2
6 males outside her apartment entrance were smoking cigarettes. Det. Parks
7 later collected cigarette butts in this general area as evidence.

8 As Hernandez walked to her apartment, the two males near the entrance to her
9 apartment approached her and stated they had been waiting for her. One of the
10 suspects had a gun and said that he knew Hernandez lived alone. He also knew
11 Hernandez would get home around 6:00 to 7:00 PM and that she made them wait
12 three hours. They then forced Hernandez into their vehicle. Hernandez stated
13 she screamed and yelled for help and fought back, but no one helped her. As
14 Hernandez fought, one of the suspects shot at her but missed. The suspects
15 eventually forced Hernandez into the back seat of their vehicle and she was
16 made to lie on the floorboard. Two of the suspects sat in the back with
17 Hernandez. They kicked her head multiple times to keep her on the floorboard.
18 The suspects then took Hernandez's purse with approximately \$20,000.00 worth
19 of gold, her credit cards, her vehicle and apartment keys, and whatever
20 jewelry she was wearing. The suspects then drove off with Hernandez wedged
21 down on the back seat floorboard, with her head against the driver's seat.
22 The suspects then forced Hernandez to provide the PIN for her credit
23 cards/banks cards by drilling into her right hand with a power drill. In the
24 body worn camera footage, Hernandez had a visible injury to the top of her
25 right hand, which the suspects had drilled into. They threatened to kill her
and her family if she reported the incident.

On 01/23/2025 I conducted a follow-up interview with Hernandez at Harborview
Medical Center. Hernandez stated that after providing her PIN number to her
cellphone the suspects found her bank information on her phone. The suspects
then drove to a gas station, where they confirmed that the PIN number was
correct. Hernandez was not certain of where she was or when the suspects had
stopped at the gas station. Hernandez stated that she heard the suspects say,
go east. Hernandez heard the GPS on one of the suspect's phone say to take I-
90 towards Spokane. While they were driving Hernandez said the suspects were
scaring her. They said, "We're going to kill you, your family, and that the
bears are going to eat you." I asked Hernandez if she remembered what the
suspects were saying to one another while they were driving. Hernandez told
me that they were saying "to hit her, kill her, we'll just go dump her
somewhere far." Hernandez said, "The one that was holding her head down with
his feet in the back was asking the driver if he was scared and that they
were already into this." The driver hit a curb and scratched the car at some
point and that is when the guy in back seat asked the driver if he was
scared. The suspect with the gun was in the back seat and had the gun "on
her". He went by the name, "Charlie". Hernandez thought the damage from
hitting the curb would be on the driver's side of the vehicle. When the
vehicle was recovered there was damage on the driver's side consistent with
hitting a curb. Charlie was wearing white with black and red trim Jordans or
Nike shoes. Hernandez thought "Charlie" was wearing a black or dark gray
sweatshirt and black skinny pants. Hernandez thought the other male in the
back seat was wearing a gray sweater. Hernandez thought "Charlie" was
running the show and he was about 24 years old. The driver moved his seat
back to pin her head in more but she never saw the driver. I later received
evidence from Ojeda's car collected during the search warrant that was a
cellphone box that contained a cellphone case, United States of America

1 Permanent Resident card belonging to Ojeda, social security card belonging to
2 Ojeda and a social security card belonging to a "Charlie Manzano".

3 The suspects stopped along I-90, where they took Hernandez out of their
4 vehicle. Hernandez told me that one of the suspects said Hernandez heard too
5 much and wanted her dead. They then threw her over a retaining wall/jersey
6 barrier. The suspect who had shot at Hernandez earlier in the parking
7 lot(Ojeda)of her apartment complex pointed the gun at her and shot at her
8 again. Hernandez stated she ducked and was struck in the shoulder. Hernandez
9 believes the suspect thought he had hit her in the head, so she yelled and
10 played dead. Once the suspects left the area, Hernandez climbed over the
11 retaining wall/jersey barrier and flagged down a passerby. Kittitas County
12 Sheriff's Office Detective Blume, Martin & Sinclair canvassed the area where
13 Hernandez was located. A 9mm Luger shell casing, lip gloss, and black piece
14 of cloth material with a button were recovered. There was a large amount of
15 blood present in the snow as well.

16 During Hernandez's interview, Det. Blume advised that Hernandez's vehicle was
17 not at her apartment complex, indicating that the suspect must have returned
18 to the scene and taken her vehicle. Hernandez advised that she and her son
19 are the registered owners of her 2022 Hyundai Elantra and that her son
20 currently lives in Wisconsin. Hernandez believes the suspects returned to the
21 scene and used her key to take her vehicle.

22 On 1/23/25 Det. Parks researched Hernandez's license plate in the DOL
23 database. A search of Hernandez's license plate, in FLOCK, showed a hit on
24 1/21/25 at 2310 hours at Pacific Hwy and S. 216th St. in Des Moines. FLOCK
25 cameras are license plate readers that capture high quality images of
vehicles and their license plates. This was approximately the time Hernandez
was arriving to Harborview Medical Center in Seattle. The hit occurred while
Hernandez was being treated at Harborview Medical Center.

Law enforcement obtained Hernandez's Chase bank records, as well as GPS and
location data for Hernandez's cell phone and vehicle via judicial
authorization. According to the records, Hernandez's cell phone was in the
area of her residence at about 2000 hours on 01/21/2025. The device headed
north, then eastbound on I-90. At approximately 2015 hours, the device
appeared to exit the highway at 150th Ave. SE., in Bellevue. Hernandez's
phone remained in the area for about 15 minutes before continuing east on I-
90 at approximately 2035 hours. Hernandez's bank statement showed an ATM
withdrawal for \$42.00 from 15100 SE. 38th St., Bellevue. This is within close
proximity of Hernandez's device. The location is a shopping center that is
shared by a Shell gas station, a Safeway, a Rite Aid, a Chase bank and other
smaller businesses.

From approximately 2106 to 2130 hours, Hernandez's cell phone traveled along
I-90 to the location where Hernandez was shot and left on the roadside. Her
device continued east to exit 62, Stampede Pass/Lake Kachess exit, where it
changed direction and headed westbound on I-90 back towards Seattle. From
approximately 2140 to 2240 hours, there was a gap in cell phone data,
indicating that Hernandez's device was either off or the suspects turned off
her location data. At about 2243 hours, Hernandez's device was locating north
of her home, likely the point in time when the suspects returned to steal
Hernandez's gold Hyundai Elantra and heading north towards Seattle. The
device continued north and at about 2245 hours, the device is near SR-99, to
about the Spokane St. Viaduct and remained in the area for several minutes. A

1 search of that area revealed a Gull gas station located at 3215 4th Ave S.
2 Hernandez's bank statement showed an in-person transaction posted to her
3 account on 1/22/25 at Kitimat Seattle Gull, for \$17.07. King County
4 Sheriff's Office Det. McGrath conducted a follow-up to the Gull Gas station
5 and retrieved CCTV footage from Jea Jung, part-owner of Gull gas station.
6 Det. McGrath observed a time offset of approximately -44 minutes. Video
7 footage depicted Hernandez's vehicle arriving around 2247 hours (time stamp
8 2332 hours), followed by what appears to be a blue Chevy Malibu. A male later
9 identified as Kevin Daniel Sanabria Ojeda wearing a grey sweater, black pants
10 and red, white yellow and black shoes exits the driver's seat of the victim's
11 car and interacts with the driver of the blue Chevy Malibu. The driver of the
12 victim's vehicle appeared to be white or Hispanic. The driver of the blue
13 Malibu appears to be a male, wearing a black jacket, black pants, white shoes
14 and a black ballcap. As the driver of the Malibu walked to the rear passenger
15 side to pump gas, the rear passenger door briefly pops open, indicating a
16 rear passenger inside the Malibu later identified as Alexander Arnaez
17 Gutierrez.

18 Hernandez's cell phone then went southbound on I-5, where it exited and
19 traveled near the intersection on Pacific Hwy S. and S 216th St. at
20 approximately 2310 hours. This corresponds with Hernandez's vehicle's FLOCK
21 hit at Pacific Hwy S. and S. 216th St at about the same time. Hernandez's
22 cell phone then continued south to Kent Des Moines Memorial Dr. and Pacific
23 Hwy S. On the southwest corner of this intersection, is a shopping center.
24 Hernandez's device remained in the area between approximately 2310 and 2325
25 hours, before continuing south along I-5 to Tigard, OR.

During the follow up investigation, I requested a bulletin of the victim's
vehicle to be disseminated to Oregon and California police agencies. On
1/23/25 at approximately 1930 hours, Det. Parks was advised by Special Agent
Perry with the FBI that Sgt. Clausen of the Lake Oswego Police Department
located Hernandez's vehicle at the intersection of Bangy Rd. and Bonita Rd.
in Lake Oswego, OR. Sgt Clausen identified Hernandez's vehicle by its license
plate.

Hernandez's vehicle was ultimately impounded and towed to King County AFIS to
be processed for evidence.

Through further investigation, detectives learned the license plate for the
Chevy Malibu to be WA CLN0263. The vehicle was registered to Kevin Daniel
Sanabria Ojeda. Investigation into Ojeda showed a previous address for him
located at 5431 Bonita Rd. This address was approximately a half mile from
where the victim's car was located.

I provided Ojeda's plate to FBI Special Agent Perry.

Special Agent Perry advised there was a license plate reader (LPR) hit on
01/29/2025 at 0455 hours CST, 0255 hours PST for Ojeda's license plate of WA
CLN0263. This LPR hit placed the vehicle at the Red Roof Inn, located at 2450
173rd St, Lansing, IL. FBI Special Agent Scott Erthal in Illinois conducted a
follow up to the Red Roof Inn and learned that Ojeda checked in using his
Washington stated ID and provided a phone number of 708-541-5867. Ojeda was
staying in room 204. Special Agent Erthal also viewed CCTV footage from the
Red Roof Inn and captured several still images of Ojeda with a male
associate. The male associate was later identified as PA. His identity is
known to law enforcement. Due to concerns for thier safety they will only be
referred to by thier initials throughout this report.

1
2 On 1/30/2025, at approximately 0745 hours, FBI Special Agent Dougherty
3 advised that Ojeda was taken into custody, and his blue Malibu was impounded
4 and taken to a secured facility. Agent Dougherty also advised that he could
5 see in plain view, a power drill inside Ojeda's Malibu. FBI Special Agent
6 Callaghan emailed Det. Parks and advised that he had observed a large amount
of jewelry in plastic bags in Ojeda's motel room. A second person was
detained with Ojeda. This individual is hereafter referred to as PA. This
individual's identity is known by law enforcement and has been confirmed, but
his initials are included here for his safety. Detectives later learned PA
had traveled there with Ojeda from Oregon.

7 On January 30, 2025, Detectives Blume, Parks and I traveled to Chicago. Upon
8 arrival we learned that Federal Agents had already been granted a search
9 warrant for the hotel room and had conducted the search without us present.
10 Information relayed to us was that several items of jewelry had been
recovered along with a 9mm handgun, gold/brass colored ammunition and
clothing items. In addition, jewelry was located on Ojeda's person incident
to arrest. We were advised of Ojeda's location at the Cook County Sheriff's
Office. Photographs of the jewelry were shown to Hernandez and she confirmed
they belonged to her.

11 Upon arrival we were briefed by a TFO (Task Force Officer) that was a part of
12 the arrest team and search of Ojeda. Detective Blume and I interviewed Ojeda
via the language line. The operator was identified as Ana #437869 and the
13 interview was both audio and visually recorded. I advised Ojeda of his
Miranda rights from a department issued card and he stated that he was
willing to talk with us. Post Miranda, Ojeda stated that he participated in
14 the kidnapping, vehicle theft, robbery and killing of the "lady" known to
investigators as Maria Hernandez. Ojeda detailed that he drove his vehicle,
15 the referenced blue Chevy Malibu from Oregon to Washington with "Daniel" who
lived at the Oregon house, 5431 Bonita Rd. Once in Washington, they picked
up another subject by the name of "Alexander" from the Rainier area of
16 Seattle. According to Ojeda, Alexander was not known to Ojeda and was an
associate of Daniel's.

17 According to Ojeda prior to leaving Oregon, Daniel told Ojeda that he had
18 business in Seattle and that he had a plan to make money. Once in Seattle,
Daniel added that he had been watching a lady for a couple months. Daniel
19 allegedly told Ojeda where to drive to and they arrived at an apartment
complex (Hernandez's complex). Ojeda stated he was still driving the Chevy
20 Malibu and Daniel and Alexander allegedly exited the vehicle to wait for the
lady in the parking lot. When she arrived, they approached her and kidnapped
21 her by forcing her into the back seat of the Chevy Malibu. During this
struggle, Daniel allegedly shot the gun off in the parking lot. This shot
missed Hernandez and hit the ground. Ojeda advised that Daniel allegedly
22 brought the gun with him. Ojeda stated that Daniel told him to drive towards
Kennewick.

23 During this drive described by Hernandez, investigators had learned from
24 Hernandez that she was forced to give them her passcode to her phone to
access her credit cards by the use of a power drill into the back of her
hand. Ojeda confirmed that Daniel used a drill on Hernandez's person and
25 Ojeda stated that he heard the sound of the drill during this and Maria
screaming. A similar described drill was seen by federal agents referenced
above and Ojeda confirmed the drill used in this incident belonged to him and

1 was in his Chevy Malibu. Ojeda recalled that they stopped one time at an
2 ATM near a gas station in Bellevue where Ojeda withdrew \$40.00 dollars from
an ATM from Hernandez's account.

3 Ojeda told detectives that after this stop, they continued to drive east,
eventually stopping on the side of the highway. According to Ojeda, Daniel
4 and Alexander made Hernandez get out of the car and climb up a wall and then
he allegedly heard a gunshot. They got back in the car without Hernandez and
5 drove back to Hernandez's apartment and Ojeda stole her vehicle from her
apartment complex parking lot using Hernandez's keys that they stole from
6 her. They also took her purse containing jewelry. This purse was described
to investigators by Hernandez as containing her wallet, keys to her house and
7 vehicle and nearly \$20,000 dollars worth of jewelry/gold. Ojeda confirmed
that some of the jewelry taken from his person during the arrest and jewelry
8 taken from the hotel room was in fact the jewelry that was stolen from
Hernandez. He also confirmed that the firearm recovered from the hotel room
9 was the firearm that was used to kill Hernandez, and that Daniel allegedly
had given it to him afterwards.

10 Daniel drove the Chevy Malibu back to Oregon and Alexander was dropped
somewhere in Washington prior to heading back to Oregon. Ojeda thought it was
11 somewhere off Rainier. Ojeda drove Hernandez's car back to Oregon. Ojeda
stated that just prior to this, they stopped at a gas station (Gull gas
12 station). Ojeda kept Hernandez's cell phone and continued to use it for
several days as he claimed he did not have a phone. Ojeda also stated that
13 he stopped at a mall in Oregon to buy himself new shoes with Hernandez's bank
cards because he felt bad about what happened. I collected these shoes as
14 evidence from the jail. Ojeda confirmed Alexander's last name as Gutierrez
and Daniel's name was Nelson or his name was Nelson Daniel. He later disposed
15 of the cell phone and described to investigators where he threw it and also
where he dumped the victim's vehicle, both at locations in Lake Oswego Oregon
near his residence.

16 I showed Ojeda pictures of himself at the Gull gas station with another
unknown male. Ojeda confirmed that the person shown to him was in fact
17 himself and identified the other male as Daniel. Ojeda also identified the
shoes he was wearing in the video on that evening as being his and that they
18 were currently located in his Chevy Malibu. The black jeans he was wearing
in the video were either in the hotel room or his vehicle. Additionally, the
19 grey sweatshirt he was wearing was left in Maria's vehicle, the gold Hyundai
Elantra. This sweatshirt was collected as evidence when detectives searched
20 Hernandez's vehicle. Based on Ojeda's admissions and the victim's statements,
Ojeda is the individual Hernandez described as the shooter.

21 Special Agent David Bustos and Special Agent Evan Hylton collected a cell
phone and a tablet from Ojeda's person and a cell phone from PA's person.
22 Judicial authorization was granted for the search of these devices.

23 Det Sobczyk with the Digital Forensics Unit (DFU) completed a download of
Ojeda's tablet and PA's cell phone device. Ojeda's tablet had an associated
24 phone number of 206-806-3177. Ojeda's tablet communicated through third
party apps, such as Facebook and TikTok. All text/chat communication were in
25 Spanish. Ojeda's Facebook name appeared as "Yeniel Vnz1" with an account ID
number 100028206110202, with an associated email address of
ksanabriaojeda@gmail.com.

1 Det. Cueva was later reviewing a Facebook Chat between Yeniel Vnzl (Kevin)
2 and Alexander Gutierrez from 01/22/2025 (the day after our crime) where
3 Alexander Gutierrez says, "Mano se me quedo el fondo en tuu carro causa lo
4 necesito asme el coro." Det. Cueva translated this to "Bro I left my "fondo"
5 in your car I need it do me that favor." Det. Cueva thought "fondo" could be
6 a phone or a holster. Det. Cueva later clarified with PA that "fondo" was
7 phone.

8 Det. Parks then conducted a key word search for "Alexander Gutierrez" in
9 Ojeda's Cellebrite report and noted several chat and call logs to a Facebook
10 username "Alexander Gutierrez" (Facebook ID - 100046273597295). Det. Parks
11 viewed Alexander Guriterrez's Facebook page. The page had a profile picture
12 of a scorpion tattoo, and the photo library had images of a Hispanic male, in
13 his early 20's,

14 Alexander Gutierrez was Facebook friends with PA (Facebook ID -
15 61569764041649).

16 On 2/12/25, Detective Sobczyk was able to gain access in the phone found on
17 Ojeda's person at the time of his arrest. The device data was uploaded to
18 Cellebrite. Det. Parks and I viewed the account info and noted an associated
19 phone number of 206-371-2713. This number was run through CLEAR and
20 identified T-Mobile at the network carrier. Ojeda's device appears to contain
21 account information for "Alexander Gutierrez" with associated Facebook ID. A
22 check of the device photo gallery showed an image of a male similar in
23 appearance to the Facebook user, "Alexander Gutierrez." Another photo
24 depicted a letter from the Low-Income Housing Institute Asylum Seeker Rent
25 Assistance Program; and at the bottom of the letter, the "client" was
identified as "Alexander Moises Arnaez." This letter was dated 11/06/2024 and
had a Client Unit # listed as 518A. Det. Parks and I believe that the device
found on Ojeda belongs to the suspect identified by Ojeda as Alexander
Gutierrez. This is consistent with Det. Cueva's translation from Gutierrez to
Ojeda saying that he left his phone in Ojeda's car.

On 02/28/25 I contacted Agent Moore and requested that we get the location of
PA. Detectives needed to interview PA as soon as possible. Agent Moore called
and advised that PA's ankle monitor was placing him in Texas. Agent Moore
forwarded me the address in Texas. This address is known by law enforcement.

On 03/01/2025 I flew to Texas and met up with Det. Cueva and Agent Moore who
were already in Texas. On 03/02/2025 Det. Cueva, Agent Moore and I met up
and conducted surveillance at the known address in Texas. This address is an
apartment complex where PA's ankle monitor was showing his presence. At about
1300 hours Agent Moore checked in with her ERO (Enforcement and Removal
Officer) contact that was monitoring PA's location and was informed that his
location had changed, and he was in a warehouse about 20 minutes away and had
left the apartment complex at approximately 1030 hours. We drove to the
warehouse location. Shortly after we arrived at the location of the
warehouse a car left occupied by two individuals. Det. Cueva thought one of
the occupants looked like PA, so he followed the vehicle in his car. I was
in a vehicle with Agent Moore. I followed Det. Cueva while Agent Moore tried
to get an updated location for PA. While Agent Moore was waiting on an
updated location, I followed Det. Cueva into a McDonald's parking lot. The
vehicle we followed parked at that location and Agent Moore got an update
that PA's ankle monitor showed at the McDonald's. The vehicle was parked and
a short statured male exited out of the passenger seat. I recognized the

1 male as PA. Det. Cueva and I approached PA on foot. I introduced myself as
2 a detective with the King County Sheriff's Office. Det. Cueva told PA that
3 we were the police in Spanish and then had a short conversation with PA in
4 Spanish. PA was with his cousin and was on lunch break to get food when we
5 approached him. PA agreed to speak with us and told his cousin what was
6 going on. PA was not detained in any way. We moved our cars to a different
7 location in the parking lot and PA got into the front passenger side of Det.
8 Cueva's vehicle. The door was unlocked for him to exit the vehicle at any
9 point in time and Det Cueva had PA open and close the door on his own to show
10 he could leave. PA provided a recorded statement. The below is a summary of
11 conversation and is not meant to be a verbatim account.

12 I told PA that we were there from Washington to talk with him about the lady
13 that was kidnapped and the gold. PA said that he did know about the incident
14 because he was told about it but denied any involvement in the situation. PA
15 told us that he (Kevin) showed up to the house in Portland where they were
16 living with the gold and then they went to Chicago where they were picked up
17 (arrested). He said that he knew three people were involved but was not
18 aware of who the third person was. PA said Kevin came to the Portland house
19 by himself. I told PA that he needed to tell us the truth and I know that
20 what he just told me was not the truth. PA said he has known Kevin for about
21 9 months to a year. They met in Seattle and then they moved to the house on
22 Bonita in Oregon. Kevin told him that he robbed the lady. Kevin left by
23 himself and came back a couple days later with the gold, but Kevin did not
24 really explain what was going on. I asked PA about posting photographs of
25 the jewelry on his phone. PA said that Kevin gave him the phone two days
after the incident with the lady. Kevin told him that when he got home from
work, he had something to give him. PA said that Kevin gave him the phone
and a gold chain, bracelet and a pair of earrings. I asked him what he did
with the jewelry. PA said the jewelry was taken away when he got arrested in
Chicago. I asked PA about the messages on the phone about killing the lady
and stealing her gold. PA denied sending that message and stated Kevin used
the phone. Kevin told him that he robbed and kidnapped the lady when he came
back, and they had been watching the lady for two days. Kevin was with
someone else that PA denied knowing. Kevin gave him the jewelry because he
had helped him with work, and they lived together. I let PA know that we
spoke with Kevin for about 4 hours, and he told us that PA was not involved.
I told PA that we know Kevin was with Daniel. PA said that he does know
Daniel and they went to a town in Washington where they pick apples then to
Chicago. PA said there were two cars that left Oregon. PA thought the first
car was a white Camry that had Daniel, Daniel's wife and Daniel's Cousin and
his brother-in-law. The second car was the blue Malibu, and it was Kevin and
PA in the Malibu. When they got to the town where they picked apples they
split up.

21 I asked PA when and where he got the gold jewelry from Kevin, and he said he
22 was at the house on Bonita when Kevin gave him the gold after the lady was
23 kidnapped. Kevin arrived at the house on Bonita with a gray car and told PA
24 that he bought it. Daniel arrived in the blue Malibu. PA thought Daniel and
25 Kevin both had gold jewelry and that was why they were arguing over who had
more. PA said they left for Chicago because of the problem with the
kidnapping. PA left with them because he did not want to stay behind alone.
The plan was to go to the tri-cities but then they decided to go to Chicago.
PA said they had to go to an immigration appointment in Chicago and they had
family and friends in Chicago.

1 I asked PA what he knew about the kidnapping again. PA said Kevin and Daniel
2 left the Bonita house to go to Seattle. Kevin was on a motorcycle and Daniel
3 was in the Malibu. Two days later when they came back it was Kevin and
4 Daniel, Kevin in the lady's car and Daniel in the Malibu. He did not know
5 where the motorcycle went or if it was part of the deal with the robbery. PA
6 thought they left in the morning and came back in the night time. PA said it
7 was normal for Kevin and him to go back and forth to Seattle because they had
8 friends there. I asked PA about Alexander Gutierrez again. PA said he knew
9 an Alexander who lives in Seattle. I showed PA a picture of Alexander
10 Gutierrez's photographs from his Facebook account. PA identified the person
11 in the photographs as the person he knew as Alexander from Seattle. PA said
12 Alexander goes by the nickname of "Negro" and he also goes by the name of
13 "Devil".

14 I asked PA how Kevin, Daniel and Alexander knew about the lady in Seattle and
15 about her gold. PA thought someone else in Seattle told Kevin about the
16 gold. It could have been "Negro"(Alexander). I asked PA where they ended up
17 selling the jewelry. He said they sold some in Chicago at a few pawn shops.
18 PA did not know if any gold was sold in Oregon. He thought maybe they
19 (Daniel and Kevin) did because they came to the house with cash. I asked PA
20 when and where Daniel gave him jewelry. Daniel gave him the gold chain three
21 days after they got there. Daniel gave his wife some gold and gave him the
22 chain to be nice. It was small.

23 I asked PA why he was not included in the robbery plan. He said he was told
24 about the plan, and he did not want to go. PA said that Alexander was the
25 third person involved in the kidnapping of the lady, and he also said he was
concerned about the recording and was scared of talking about Alexander's
involvement. PA told detectives that someone showed up at his house with a
gun and threatened to kill him if he talked so he left to come to Texas. PA
did not recognize the person that showed up at his house or their vehicle.

Kevin told PA about the robbery and asked him if he wanted to be part of it.
He said he does not steal and would rather beg than steal, so he decided not
to go. PA did not know where the planning of the robbery occurred. The day
they took off is when they invited him. Daniel and Kevin told him that they
had someone surveilling the woman and were going to wait for the lady to get
wherever she was in her car and then jump out on her and grab her. PA said
Alexander was the one driving during the kidnapping and that Alexander lives
close to a Lowes on Rainier in an apartment complex. He has not been to
Alexander's apartment, but Daniel and Kevin have. PA thought Alexander had a
gold Cadillac sedan. PA said they took the lady up towards the mountain and
he asked if we found the body yet. PA said they took the lady, and Kevin is
the one that shot the lady and killed her, and Daniel talked to PA about
drilling the lady's hand. They took her to a mountain. I asked if Alexander
had some of the gold and he thought he should have some of the gold because
all three were together.

I asked PA how he knew Alexander was involved and PA said that Kevin and
Daniel told him. PA did not hear anything directly from Alexander about this
incident. PA had met Alexander personally in Seattle on a previous occasion
unrelated to this. PA said that Kevin and Daniel told him Alexander was the
driver and Kevin and Daniel grabbed the lady, Kevin killed the lady, and
Daniel drilled the lady's hand. They took the gold and the car. He thought
it was an Elantra. Special agent Moore asked why they drilled the lady's
hand. PA said they drilled her hand because the lady would not give them the

1 "codes," but he did not know what the codes were or if the lady had a safe or something.

2 We ended our statement with PA. He was given a drive back to work to meet his
3 cousin, but his cousin was not there, so we drove him to his cousin's
4 apartment. He said it was okay to contact him if we had more questions later.

5 On 03/08/2025 Det. Cueva called me and advised that he was reviewing the
6 Cellebrite Reader report for evidence item 28, which is a cellphone that
7 appears to belong to Alexander Arnaez Gutierrez. Det. Cueva located a
8 WhatsApp message between Alexander and a person named "Rara" on 01/11/2025
9 that stated the below:

10 "Rara" asked GUTIERREZ for \$20. GUTIERREZ told "Rara" that he wanted "Rara"
11 "to stay one night" in his apartment. "Rara" asked where GUTIERREZ's place is
12 located. GUTIERREZ told "Rara" "in the rainier." Then GUTIERREZ sent a
13 screenshot of an apartment complex "Flourish on Rainier"

14 GUTIERREZ asked why "Rara" wanted the address, but there was no further
15 response from "Rara."

16 On a "Facebook Messenger" text message conversation that occurred on
17 01/20/2025 (the day before our crime) at 9:18 p.m., between "ALEXANDER
18 GUTIERREZ (owner)" Facebook ID number 100046273597295 and "YENIEL VNZL"
19 [Later identified as belonging to KEVIN DANIEL SANABRIA OJEDA] Facebook ID
20 number 100028206110202. GUTIERREZ shared his home address with SANABRIA OJEDA

21 It appears that GUTIERREZ and SANABRIA OJEDA had attempted to video call each
22 other a few minutes prior to GUTIERREZ sending a screenshot of an apartment
23 complex named "Flourish on Rainier." According to the text message data, the
24 screenshot was sent at 9:18:03 p.m.

25 Several seconds after the screenshot was sent to SANABRIA OJEDA (at 9:18:41
p.m.) it appears that GUTIERREZ and SANABRIA OJEDA had a video call. There
were no further messages on this conversation.

In summary, the third outstanding suspect in this case has been identified as
Alexander Moises Arnaez Gutierrez. Ojeda identifies Alexander Gutierrez as
being involved in the Kidnapping, Robbery, Assault and Attempted Murder of
Hernandez and PA identified a photograph of Alexander Gutierrez from Facebook
as being the person he knows as as Alexander from Seattle and as being
involved in the crimes against Hernandez. The cellphone believed to belong
to Gutierrez was taken off of Sanabria Ojeda's person incident to his arrest
in Chicago and the information from the subsequent search warrant of the
device provided the information that the phone most likely belonged to
Gutierrez and contained his housing records and Facebook conversations with
Ojeda about leaving his phone in Ojeda's vehicle the day after the crimes
against Hernandez.

On 04/08/2025 Gutierrez was arrest by Mercer Island Police Department on a
traffic stop and was subsequently transported to Renton for an interview.
Gutierrez was read his Miranda rights in Spanish by Deputy Hernandez-Camacho.
Gutierrez said that he was so scared that he was shaking. I did not observe
any shaking and Guttierrez appeared calm. Gutierrez requested an attorney but
confirmed he did know Ojeda and that he lived at the Flourish on Rainier
Apartment complex in unit 518A and denied knowing Daniel. Gutierrez said he
did not know his phone number.
